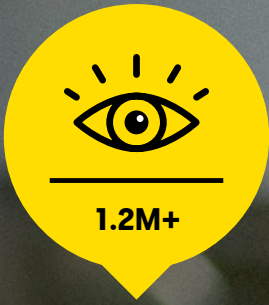

EPISODES

Episode One: Toilet Paper

The battle for toilet paper during the Covid-19 years showed us just how much we value the stuff. In this episode, Dr Karl lifts the lid to discover how recycled toilet paper is made at the Encore toilet paper factory.

Episode Two: Chocolate

At the Haigh's chocolate factory, Dr Karl gets the full Willy Wonka experience of how this sweet treat is made, following it from bean to bar he discovers that the future of chocolate is in jeopardy.

Episode Three: Ginger Beer

This episode takes a peek inside the Bundaberg Ginger Beer Master Brewery. From the ginger farm to the packing line, Dr Karl examines how this iconic soft drink is made from a spice and then fermented, and finally produced for consumption.

Episode Four: Cricket Balls

In this episode, we visit the Kookaburra Sport cricket ball factory in Melbourne and learn about the humble beginnings of this global symbol of Australian sport.

Episode Five: Lollies

We know we shouldn't, but most of us can't resist the temptation of a lolly. At the Allen's factory, we step onto the factory floor to see how 'Snakes Alive' are made - spoiler alert, the most popular flavour is red.

Episode Six: Cheese

In this peep behind Bega's factory doors, Dr Karl learns how cheese is made...and it appears that he knows more about String Theory, than he does about string cheese.





Dr Karl Kruszelnicki PRESENTER

Dr Karl Kruszelnicki AM brings science to life with wit and charm.

Known as an author and a science commentator and 'populariser' on Australian radio, television, and podcasts, Dr Karl is the Julius Sumner Miller Fellow in the Science Foundation for Physics at the School of Physics, University of Sydney.

The only child of Holocaust survivors who fled to Australia in 1950, Karl always forged his own destiny in an idiosyncratic way. Before he became one of the world's favourite scientific storytellers, he ambled through a convoluted cacophony of a career.

In the 1960s, he got his start as a physicist at the Port Kembla Steelworks and promptly joined the Steel Industries Auto Club, racing modified rally cars on Wollongong's deserted back roads. In the 1970s, he entered his self-described 'drug-crazed hippie years', making a living as a long-haired, dope-smoking taxi driver.

After he applied to be a NASA astronaut in the 1980s and 'failed', he ended up live broadcasting the first space shuttle launch on triple j instead. Unexpectedly, that blasted off his media career, and from there it was a stratospheric rise from radio to TV, books, newspapers, speaking, podcasts and the internet.

Karl's story teaches us that you don't have to know all the answers, as long as you ask the right questions.

With infectious enthusiasm, Karl continues his mission to spread the good news about science and its benefits.

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
