How to Make a Hey Diddle Diddle Picture

You will need:

- A piece of firm cardboard
- Black, green, brown and grey paint
- Paint brushes
- Textas
- Scissors
- 4 x A4 sheets of light cardboard
- Glue stick or paste
- Small pipe cleaner
- Masking tape

Instructions:

Paint some hills, sky and a moon on to the cardboard to create the scene. While your painting is drying draw a cow, a cat playing the fiddle, a laughing dog and a dish and spoon with one picture on each of the A4 sheets of light card. Use the paint to add some colour to your drawings. When these are dry cut out each of your pictures. Attach the cat playing the fiddle, the laughing dog and the dish and spoon using your glue stick or paste. Attach the pipe cleaner to the back of the cow using masking tape. To help your cow fly over the moon cut a slit in to the night sky of the picture. Place the cow on the front of the picture and push the pipe cleaner through to the back. Now move the pipe cleaner across the back of your picture and the cow will fly over the moon. Amazing!

How to make a moving face

You will need:

- 2 sheets of cardboard
- A chopstick
- Crayons or markers
- Scissors
- Glue stick

Instructions

Cut out two round face shapes from the cardboard, make sure that they are both the same size. Place one face shape down and position the chopstick so that the tip of it is in the centre, coming out at the bottom. Paste around the chopstick, and then stick the other round face shape on top, lining up the edges. Use the markers or crayons to draw the same face on both sides, but change the facial expressions. You could have a happy face and a sad face, or a surprised face and an angry face. Use your hands to rub the chopstick back and forth, watch as the face changes.

How to make a sun and moon moving picture

You will need:

- A piece of dark blue or black cardboard
- Some yellow cut out stars
- A white cut out moon
- Glue stick
- Two pieces of elastic
- A pen

Instructions

Cut the cardboard into a circle. Paste the yellow stars on one side, and the moon on the other side. Use the pen to punch two small holes in the cardboard, one on each side of the circle. Thread one piece of elastic through each side and tie a knot. Turn the circle a few times to wind-up the elastic and watch the picture move between the stars and the moon.

How to Make a Woolly Monkey

You will need:

- Two balls of brown wool, one larger than the other
- 5 black pipe cleaners
- Light brown felt
- Black felt tip pen
- Craft glue

Instructions:

Attach the two balls of wool together by inserting two pipe cleaners through the centre of both balls of wool so that they are vertical. Turn the balls of wool so that the smaller ball is on the top. Turn the ends of the two pipe cleaners at the top of the small ball of wool over to create small ears. Use the long ends of the pipe cleaners at the base to create two legs for your monkey. Insert another pipe cleaner through the larger ball of wool in a horizontal direction. This pipe cleaner will become the monkey's arms. Insert another pipe cleaner for a long windy tail. Cut a small face shape from the felt and add monkey eyes, nose and mouth using the black felt tip pen. Attach the face to your monkey with strong craft glue. Your monkey is now ready to swing through the trees and hang from the branches using her twisty, bendy pipe cleaner arms and legs.

How to make a tablet "camera"

You will need:

- Cardboard cut out frame
- 2 yellow round stickers
- 1 red round sticker
- Marker
- A piece of ribbon
- Glue stick

Instructions

Put one round yellow sticker on the top right hand side of the frame for the play button, use a marker to draw a triangle on it. Put another yellow sticker to the left of it for the pause button, and draw two vertical lines on it. Put the red sticker on next, this will be the record button. Use the glue stick to paste the ribbon along the rest of the length of the top of the frame, this is to make the video go forwards and backwards. Use your tablet to record a video.



How to make a Cake Shape Book

You will need:

- 6 sheets of paper
- Various cut out shapes in different sizes and colours
- Glue stick
- A hole punch
- 2 pipe cleaners

Instructions

Use the hole punch to make two holes in the short side of the sheets of paper. We will use these holes to make the sheets into a book at the end. Design a cake on each page using the different shapes. You could make a star out of two triangles, or a train out of some rectangles and small circles. Once you choose what shape to make each cake, paste the shapes down. Do this for each page. When you have finished, line the pages up and use the pipe cleaners to tie the pages together, threading one through each hole and twisting it to keep all the pages together.

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How to make a spinning top moving picture

You will need:

- A spinning top
- Cardboard circles
- Markers
- Round stickers
- A pen

Instructions

Use the markers to draw some patters on the cardboard circles. You could draw stripes, a spiral, or use the stickers to make a circle shape, leaving a small gap in between each sticker. Punch a small hole in the centre of each cardboard circle, using the pen. One at a time, push each circle over the top of the spinning top, and spin it to see what moving picture it makes.
