Episode 1: Magical Milk Experiment

In this experiment, Alex uses dish soap, food dye and milk to create some swirly-twirly art. He explores different mixtures and chemical reactions between safe household liquids and solids.



Scientific concept: Creating mixtures and chemical reactions.

Science process skills: Observing, predicting and comparing.

Let's investigate: Can you create swirling patterns on liquid surfaces?

Materials

- 2 x shallow trays
- Milk
- Dishwashing liquid
- Food colouring
- Cotton swabs
- Sturdy paper
- Coloured chalk
- Pop sticks

Experiment procedure

- 1. Fill a shallow tray with water.
- 2. Scrape coloured chalk dust into the tray. Lay a sheet of paper on top and then lift off to see an interesting pattern! The chalk dust should lift off the surface of the water and stick to the paper.
- **3.** Next, explore how to make swirly patterns from liquid surfaces. Add a few drops of food colouring (use an assortment of colours) to the tray filled with water. Mix the colours by swirling them around with a pop stick. These liquids should mix, but they won't create a swirly pattern.
- **4.** Fill another shallow tray with milk (a thicker liquid than water). Add a few drops of food colouring (green, blue and red). The 'blobs' of food colouring should float on the surface of the milk.
- **5.** Add dishwashing liquid to the milk (a little on the end of a cotton swab) by dabbing the 'blobs' of food colouring to create swirly, twirly patterns.
- **6.** Lay paper on top of the milk liquid and then lift off for a magical milk masterpiece!

Early Education links

Episode themes relate to EYLF Learning Outcomes 4.2, 5.1, 5.2 and 5.3. Promote learning by encouraging children to use a variety of colours to create varied patterns. Creating mixtures using visual art techniques provides opportunities for children to experiment with ways of expressing ideas through different media.

Follow-up learning

- Explore the Turkish visual arts technique of <u>Ebru</u>
 <u>Art</u>. These paintings are produced using dyes
 and a water-based solution to transfer patterns
 onto paper, fabric and other canvases.
