WHAT IS THE TRUTH BEHIND THE SECRETIVE FERTILITY INDUSTRY?

In this intensely personal film, award-winning investigative journalist Sarah Dingle takes us on a remarkable journey as she fights to uncover the truth about who made her, and how.

At the age of 27, Sarah finds out in a casual conversation that the man who brought her up, and whom she loved dearly, was not her biological father. Her parents were unable to conceive and her mother was artificially inseminated with anonymous donor sperm. At the time, there were zero laws governing the Australian fertility industry.

Digging through hospital files, chasing leads and finally uncovering her biological origins, she is not prepared for what she finds. The deeper she delves, the more disturbing her discoveries – and the more determined she becomes to tell the real story behind a powerful multi-million dollar industry that trades on emotion but that is built on secrets and lies.

Sarah is forced to confront her deepest fears about what she is uncovering – who really is her father, why were the records of her conception deliberately destroyed, and just how many siblings could she have?

- The wife of the fertility doctor destroyed the files after he retired, she burned them
- Doctor X has burnt the files in the fireplace, together with his son, a brain researcher in the eighties after terminating his private practice



As an award-winning ABC investigative journalist, Sarah has told many stories, but investigating her own truth turns out to be the best story of all – and the most challenging. As she battles her own family and a lucrative industry that's extremely reluctant to give up its secrets, she eventually realizes why. There's a lot to hide.

REBECCA RONAN

Rebecca grows up the adored only child of devoted parents, until the age of ten, when in the wake of a bitter divorce, she finds out from a friend that her beloved father is not, in fact, her father. Many years later, as an adult, she comes across an article about Sarah and reaches out – they become close friends, band together to search for their biological fathers, and then have the sweetest discovery of all – a chance in a million that turns out to be a true story that sounds like fiction.

Damian grew up in 1970s Adelaide. His mother and paraplegic father never hid the fact that he is donor conceived. As she investigates her own story and struggles to get information from the clinic where she was conceived, Sarah seeks him out as someone who has been on the same journey for much longer.

Over the years, the clinic where he was conceived tells Damian many different stories about the records of his conception, but ultimately they all turn out to be lies. Sarah and Damian reach out on social media to other donor conceived people in Australia and around the world and uncover a pattern of deliberate destruction of medical records. After searching for 30 years, Damian and his biological father are eventually united.

LIST OF INTERVIEWEES

HELEN EDEL

Helen and her twin sister Anne were conceived at Balmain hospital in 1959 after their mother sought help from the fledgling fertility industry – her husband was infertile. For years the twins had no idea of the true situation, until their stepfather broke the news when they were aged 20. They spent decades looking for the man who gave his sperm – and then through a letter their mother's doctor had written years earlier, they eventually discovered that in fact, the doctor who offered to 'help' their mother was their biological father – unbeknownst to her.

When Sarah hears Helen's story, she realises that the seemingly modern and 'regulated' industry that created her decades later was founded on lies and secrets.

SHANNON ASHTON

As Sarah looks into the dangers of what is commonly referred to as 'accidental incest', she comes across the story of Shannon, a same sex mother of five. Shannon used the same anonymous donor for all her children, starting in 2003. After a casual conversation with her family daycare provider, Shannon realises that one of the other children there has the same biological father and she discovers that there are dozens of others, all conceived at the same clinic. Her story illustrates the dangers of accidental incest, as many of the families move in the same circles but would not be aware that they share a father.

After she contacts the clinic, they provide a non-identifying list of the other 43 children with the same sperm donor, however Shannon later discovers yet another child who was born two years earlier at the same clinic, from the same donor, who is not on the list, leading her to question the lack of regulation and transparency.



LIST OF INTERVIEWEES

HEATHER WATKINS

Sarah contacts Heather after she comes up as a distant relative on Sarah's DNA results, and she turns out to be a super sleuth who helps Sarah in her search for her biological father.

Heather has an uncanny understanding of family trees and the links and markers that the results from consumer DNA kits yield. Putting it all together is a gargantuan task but Heather is up to the challenge, and Sarah finally find out the answers to her questions.

'STEVEN'

'Steven', who wants to remain anonymous, is Sarah's biological father. He's gay man who no longer lives in Sydney but for a couple of years in the 1980s he donated sperm twice a week at the hospital where Sarah was conceived (as well as at other Sydney clinics). He says he thought of it at the time as being like giving blood and it was only many years later that he realised the significance of what he'd done.

Sarah, an only child who always wanted siblings, discovers the overwhelming truth.

Sarah Dingle is a dual Walkley Award-winning investigative ABC reporter and presenter, as well as an author. In 2021 she released her first book, *Brave New Humans: The Dirty Reality of Donor Conception.* In 2019 she addressed the United Nations in Geneva on biotechnology and the rights of the child.

At the ABC she works across radio and TV current affairs. She has investigated everything from Indigenous affairs and human rights to defence and sport. Her work has also won the Walkley Foundation's Our Watch award for reporting on violence against women and children, UN Media Peace Prizes, Amnesty Media Prizes, the Voiceless Media Prize, and the Australian College of Educators Media prize.
