2024 Year in Review

Activity: The News in 2024

Which news stories from 2024 were important to you? Students will choose their top 10 news stories for 2024 and create their own quiz to test their classmates. Students' quizzes should cover a range of categories, for example: Environment, Arts, Health, Science, Technology, Sport, Politics, Entertainment.



Students can visit the [BTN subjects page](#) for a range of news topics to browse through. News stories can be a mix of local, national and world news. Students will give reasons why they think these are the top ten news stories for 2024 (1-2 sentences for each news story).

Activity: What makes something 'news'?

Have you ever wondered what makes news, news? Students will investigate what makes an event newsworthy. Before starting this activity, brainstorm some ideas as a class.

Watch BTN's [News Values](#) video, which explores what makes news, news. This video looks at the news values that determine which stories we see and hear about and which ones we don't and how those news values can shape the way we see the world.

Students will choose a range of current news stories (up to 5 news stories) and evaluate why the story is in the news and what makes it newsworthy? Students can use a T-chart to organise their information.

After completing the BTN 2024 Super Quiz, students will create their own news quiz. Students can use the following as a guide.

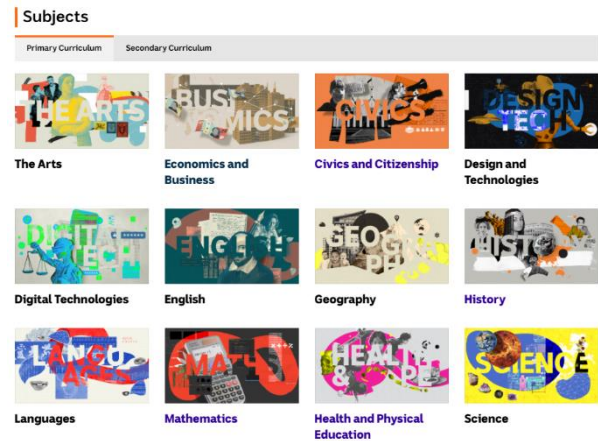
1. Make a list of news stories from 2024 that were important to you.

JUSTINA: Monsieur, monsieur.

WREN & JACK: Oh huh huh...

JACK: I'm going to do one more, I don't feel like my eyes were in it.

NAT: End scene.

And even if we do get it right, something always seems to go wrong.

WREN: My favourite kind of mistake.

AMELIA: I'm losing track of time.

JACK: Hang on everyone, I've got to go and. Scary, that was scary.

SOPH: Do not move you're totally entangled, you are a part of the set now.

TATENDA: Guys?

AMELIA: Is she going to go? Is she going to go?

JACK: Lucky I've got ink here, and all of these pens.

WREN: So, get ready, because wherever...

JOE: Sorry I don't know when I'm reacting.

But who am I kidding, the truth is we wouldn't change this job for anything.

WREN: Yeah.

JUSTINA: Who said that?

THOMAS: I looked at the camera.

WREN: Take over France and, well, our living room.

MICHELLE: Josh, do you know how to do the Nutbush? This Australian phenomenon...

JOSH: So, thanks for joining us and we'll see you next year.

JUSTINA: CUT.
