Listening to educational podcasts develops 'efferent' listening skills listening for information and ideas.



National Quality Framework links

Each ABC Kids listen production is informed by <u>Early Years</u> <u>Learning Framework of Australia</u> (EYLF), in collaboration with subject matter specialists and early childhood education experts. Our programs respond to children's interests and curriculum priorities while embedding many of the unique sounds and perspectives of culturally and linguistically diverse Australia.



Listening to podcasts together with young children by using different digital devices — interactive whiteboard, tablet, laptop or phone — enables educators to be creative in their use of equipment & materials to stimulate children's curiosity and enhance learning through play (NQS Element 3.2.2).



Digital literacy skills

The Early Childhood Australia (ECA) Statement on young children and digital technologies advocates for the value in joint media engagement for learning where children, peers and/or adults co-listen to digital content. Using the ABC Kids listen app supports digital literacy skills and a sense of agency as children make independent listening choices.

Screen-free extension Ideas

With topics ranging from child friendly news stories to exploring the weird and wonderful sounds of Australian nature, ABC Kids listen prompts children to wonder about the world, ask questions and share ideas. Listening to great quality audio can foster a love of language - promoting rich discussion and collaborative learning across the early childhood curriculum. 

5 minute podcast (ages 3+)

Story Salad is a fun and wacky improve storytelling show. Join Matt from Play School and one of his super storyteller friends as they are given three words to make up a story, on the spot!

- Listening to and talking about these improvised oral stories can help build understandings about language and story structure (<u>EYLF Learning Outcome 5.2</u>, p.44).
- After listening, children can make up their own Story Salad as a way to communicate their thoughts and feelings and spark imagination, curiosity and creativity (EYLF Learning Outcome 5, p41).

Create & Play



2 hour radio program (ages 2+)

Create & Play features a selection upbeat music designed to encourage play and inspire creativity while building interest in letters and sounds.

- Scaffold effective communication by encouraging children to respond with relevant gestures, actions, comments and questions about letter-sound relationships while co-listening (<u>EYLF Learning Outcome 5.2</u>, p.44).
- Invite children to express ideas and make meaning through the creative arts as they draw, paint, sculpt and collage while listening (EYLF Learning Outcome 5.3, p45).





Good Morning



2 hour radio program (ages 2+)

Kiruna guides listeners from sleep to play and gets your day underway. The carefully chosen music on Good Morning is for early risers and features familiar songs from Play School, Giggle & Hoot and The Wiggles to start the day.

Early years curriculum links

 This selection of songs can support routines in early learning settings as children settle into their day. Positive daily transitions help reduce stress and support children's sense of belonging (NOS Element 1.1.3).





Home Time




2 hour radio program (ages 2+)


7-12 minute podcast (ages 4+)

- Imagine This encourages children to express wonder and interest in their environments, supporting the development of important dispositions for learning (<u>EYLF Learning Outcome 4.1</u>, p.37).
- Use these topical episodes as a springboard to extend children's understandings through play using skills and processes such as inquiry, researching and investigating (<u>EYLF Learning Outcome 4.2</u>, p.38).

10-12 minute podcast (ages 4+)



6-10 minute podcast (ages 3+)

Discover the weird and wonderful sounds that nature makes on Noisy by Nature! Children will learn fun facts about animals, helping to train little ears to listen to the chorus of calls that make up the natural world around us.

- Guided conversations about insects, animals and their natural habitats featured in Noisy by Nature_provide opportunities for educators to support children in growing an appreciation and respect for the environment (EYLF Learning Outcome 2.4, p.32).

9-10 minute podcast (ages 4+)

Learn all about gardening with the ABC's Gardening Australia expert, Costa, and budding green thumb Caylee. Whether you've got a big backyard, a balcony or a little pot on a windowsill, the Gardening Buds series will inspire everyone to get growing!

Early years curriculum links

Soundwalks







Story Time



30 minute radio program (ages 3+)

Story Time features a handpicked selection of stories for preschoolers to inspire their imaginations and curiosity. Each episode includes stories from around the world, written by much-loved children's authors.

Early years curriculum links

 Listening to spoken language can help children explore multimedia narrative text and develop key literacy and numeracy concepts (<u>EYLF Learning</u> <u>Outcome 5.2</u>, p.44).

 After listening, extend learning by inviting children to retell the stories and engage in discussions about the ways these narratives are constructed.





Bedtime Stories



30 minute radio program (ages 3+)

Soothing stories for winding down and getting ready for bed are included on the Bedtime Stories series, helping young children prepare for a daytime rest or good night's sleep.

Early years curriculum links

 These carefully selected stories are a useful resource in early learning settings to help ensure each child's wellbeing and comfort is provided for in relation to sleep, rest and relaxation (NOS Element 2.1.1).





Soundwalks



6-8 minute podcast (ages 3+)

Soundwalks paints rich, audio landscapes for children to explore, with different guided relaxations. From working through big feelings and letting go of stress, to finding joy or getting ready for the day, Soundwalks uses the soothing sounds of Australian nature to help kids connect with the present, and themselves.

- Co-listening to Soundwalks can help children become strong in their emotional wellbeing by providing opportunities to enjoy moments of solitude and mindfulness, and develop understandings about emotional regulation (<u>EYLF Learning Outcome 3</u>, p.33).
- After listening, plan other play-based art & craft experiences to build mindfulness and emotional coping tools in children, by providing opportunities to express their ideas and feelings using different media (EYLF Learning Outcome 5.3, p.45) e.g. finger knitting, weaving, bracelet making, paper mache or drawing.





Classic Kids



6-10 minute podcast (ages 3+)

Treat little ears to musical soundscapes and classical compositions with Classic Kids. Produced in collaboration with Sydney Opera House Children, Families and Creative Learning Program, these podcasts feature Australianmade music to help children learn about different instrument sounds, musical concepts and vocabulary.

Early years curriculum links

- Encourage children to listen and respond to the sounds and patterns featured in the music. Use percussion instruments to follow patterns of music including beat, rhythm and tempo (EYLF Learning Outcome 5, p.41).
- This series features Dreaming Stories and is the perfect springboard to explore Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander ways of knowing and being (<u>EYLF Principle 4</u>, p.14).

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
Nature Track



1-2.5 hour podcast (ages birth+)

Nature Track_opens a window on the beautiful sounds of the Australian wilderness. These long, uninterrupted soundscapes are the perfect relaxing soundtrack for play, meditation or sleep.

- Help develop children's purposeful listening skills by tuning in and noticing different sounds made by the weather, wildlife and waterways across Australia.
- Invite children to express ideas and make meaning by recreating the sounds they hear using percussion instruments (<u>EYLF Learning Outcome 5.3</u>, p.45).

2 hour radio program (ages birth+)

Quiet Time features tranquil classical music to help relax little ones during the daily rest time routine.

Early years curriculum links

 Play during quiet times in early learning settings to create a balanced routine throughout the day, providing space for young children to engage in rest and quiet experiences (<u>NQS</u> <u>Element 1.1.3</u>).





Lullabies



1.5 hour radio program (ages birth+)

Relaxing, classic lullabies to help soothe children to sleep.

Early years curriculum links

 Intentionally including different styles of music in the educational program can help facilitate learning about language, as children enjoy the sounds and patterns in these beautifully calming songs and lullabies (<u>EYLF Learning Outcome 5.2</u>, p.44).





Dream Time



3 hour radio program (ages birth+)

Dream Time plays gentle, soothing melodies to help children sleep peacefully.

Early years curriculum links

 Dream Time is the perfect soundtrack to help babies drift off to sleep both at home and in early childhood settings. The relaxing, dreamy music will help ensure children's comfort and wellbeing during sleep routines (NOS Element 2.1.1).







Sleep Through



1 hour podcast (ages birth+)

The ambient music on Sleep Through connects children to peaceful sounds in nature for a restorative sleep. Developed by Sonic Arts School of Music at the University of NSW, these soundtracks have been carefully composed to help children feel safe and secure by using repetitive rhythms with gentle variation.

Early years curriculum links

 Choose from the wide selection of music to create calming, predictable and nurturing sleep routines for young children (<u>EYLF Learning Outcome 1.1</u>, p.24). Listen to slow waves gently wash over warm sand at the beach or soft wind moving through a calm valley.



Sleep Through



Story Salad podcasts are useful provocations for children to make-up their own oral stories. The *House, Banana, Bed* episode shares a wacky story about a young girl named Bonita who lives in a banana house!

Here are some ways to dive deeper into different storytelling techniques with preschoolers after listening to the episode:

Create a pictorial Story Map

Use props to represent items from Story Salad and guide children to develop a pictorial <u>Story Map</u> narrative script, by asking them to firstly think about the main components of a story – the characters and setting. Model language to start the story and help children develop a story structure e.g. "Once upon a time there was a banana...". Use questioning to develop a beginning, middle and end to their story ideas. Invite children to draw the story sequence and scribe their narrative script to develop understandings of key literacy concepts about print.

Put on a puppet show

Puppetry can help children investigate, imagine and explore their creativity. Provide recycled and other craft materials for children to make their own storytelling puppets. Children can also draw *Story Salad* characters on paper, laminate and attached to wooden spoons or large pop sticks. Children can use their DIY puppets to re-tell or make up a new story and perform a show!



Make a Crankie Theatre

Use a recycled cereal box, pipes (or paper towel rolls), rubber bands, masking tape, steel nuts and a long strip of brown paper to make a Crankie Theatre. This old storytelling art form gives children the opportunity to move an illustrated scroll, bringing stories to life! The pipes (or spools) are loaded into the



box with a viewing window. The scroll is then hand-cranked while children tell a story, sing a song or play music in the background. To create the 'scroll', children can draw characters or paste magazine pictures onto paper, matching the sequence of their story.

- <u>EYLF Learning Outcome 5.1</u> (p.43) Develop communication skills by modelling language and encouraging children to express themselves both verbally and non-verbally through storytelling.
- <u>EYLF Learning Outcome 5.3</u> (p.45) Repeated and varied tellings of the same story helps build understandings about vocabulary and story structure. Help children feel a sense of belonging by valuing children's language, interaction styles and ways of communicating through oral storytelling.



The <u>Imagine This</u> series can ignite children's curiosity and inspire further questions to help them make sense of the world and their place in it. The <u>Why did the dinosaurs die?</u> episode features a palaeontologist sharing fascinating facts about dinosaurs.

Here are some ways to spark further investigation about the history of dinosaurs and environmental issues in age-appropriate ways:

Create an outer space sensory tray

Use playdough planets, grey/ white rocks (asteroids), volcano models, plants, dinosaur/animal figurines and toy skeletons/bones to create the play area together. Promote deeper conversations about how dinosaurs became extinct. Discuss the important job of palaeontologists, helping us to learn more about dinosaurs by studying fossils.



Small world imaginative play

Construct a small world imaginative play space to develop scientific, creative and language skills. Provide materials including – bones, dinosaur models, blocks, rocks, hessian, large leaves, small logs and pinecones. Engage in conversations about nature, different landscapes and the importance of a sustainable environment by exploring dinosaur habitats and what they needed to survive. Research online together about where dinosaurs lived & the natural materials that were in the environment.

Construct a 3D Dinosaur model

Provide open-ended recycled and craft materials (paper towel rolls, sultana boxes, straws, pipe cleaners, pop sticks, masking tape, feathers, paint) for children to build a dinosaur model. Promote children's creativity and engineering skills as they construct these ancient creatures. Refer to factual picture books about dinosaurs



and identify features to help inform their designs.

- EYLF Learning Outcomes 2.4 and 5.3 (pp.32.45) These creative arts experiences provide a range of media for children to learn about the interdependence between land, plants and animals in the natural environment.
- EYLF Learning Outcome 5.5 (p.47) Co-listening to Imagine This helps educators facilitate deeper discovery and learning through technology, supporting young children to "access information, investigate ideas and represent their thinking".



The Classic Kids Music for The Dreaming: Galaa episode introduces preschoolers to Aboriginal culture and Dhurga language through classical music, story, movement and song. Fishing for tucker is a focus of this particular story, as an important part of summer for the Yuin People.

Here are some ways educators can use this podcast as a springboard to explore musical concepts, seasons, insects and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander ways of knowing and *being*.

Sing about summer

Introduce children to the Dhurga language and ways of the Yuin People by singing the 'Galaa Song' featured in this episode. Encourage children to listen and respond to the sounds and patterns in this cheerful, engaging music by keeping the beat using body percussion e.g. clapping hands or tapping knees.

Make and play percussion instruments

This podcast features the sounds of the clarinet and bongo drum instruments. Invite children to make and decorate their own set of drums using an empty tin (no sharp edges), balloon, rubber bands, paint, coloured foam shapes, piping and scrap material. Children can keep the beat while listening to the music on Classic Kids. Extend understandings about other musical concepts such as dynamics, tempo, timbre and rhythm while playing.



Investigate Cicada sounds and habitats

Help children identify a cicada's loud calling sound in this episode. Look at factual picture books to discover why cicadas make these sounds and why they emerge from underground during warm weather in late spring/ early summer. Talk about different seasons and how cicadas live underground during the cooler months. Build a home for a cicada by re-creating their underground tunnels using clay and modelling tools.



- EYLF Learning Outcome 1 (p.23): Educators can support children in developing a strong sense of identity by providing examples of the many ways identities and culture are recognised and expressed. Classic Kids podcasts can help build upon culturally valued approaches to learning.
