FOLLOW THESE STEPS


- 1. Watch the video resources about bias under the **Questioning the News** on the media literacy website.

- 3. Try the writing challenge: 'Protest'.


Example Story: Shark Attack

'SHARK ATTACK': Version 1








'SHARK ATTACK': Version 2

'PROTEST' worksheet: negative to police




'CELEBRITY TRIAL' Writing Exercise

Using the example story 'Shark attack' as inspiration, try rewriting this story in 2 different ways.


Using the blank templates:
