Misinformation

Focus Questions

Discuss the BTN High story as a class and record the main points of discussion. Students will then respond to the following:

- 1. What is the difference between misinformation and disinformation?
- 2. Have you ever come across misinformation online? If so, explain what it was and how you discovered it wasn't real.
- 3. What could be some consequences of believing misinformation or disinformation?
- 4. What can social media/tech companies do to make users aware of misinformation and disinformation?
- 5. What strategies could you use to be more aware of misinformation?

Activities

- Hold a class discussion about misinformation. Students will discuss their experiences with misinformation/disinformation and how easily it spreads.
- Write an essay explaining what misinformation is, and how to check the reliability of a source.
- In small groups, brainstorm strategies on how to avoid being caught out by misinformation and how to be more media literate. Present your answers to the class.
- How can misinformation and disinformation influence important global events, such as an election or a public health crisis? Give an example.
