#### Make your quiz

Students will include a range of quiz styles, for example:

- Use photos or pictures
- When an answer is revealed, provide extra information to explain the answer.



Students can make their quizzes in <u>Kahoot</u> or <u>Quizizz</u>. Make it fun, engaging, and educational!



### Activity: What's Important to You?

Hold a brainstorming session in the classroom to find out what's important to your students and how they think things could be done better in their community. Some topics for discussion include:



Use the following questions to help guide a discussion (either as a class or in small groups).

- What are you passionate about (what issues are important to you)? Rate on a scale of 1 to 10.
- What concerns do you have about the future?
- How do you think things could be done better in your community?
- Do you think you can have an impact on change in the community?

#### **Activity**

Students will think about what is important to them in their community and express this creatively through writing a letter to their SRC or local Member of Parliament, creating an artwork, or writing a poem. Before starting this activity, students will think about what they appreciate about their community, the issues they observe and what they would like to see improved. Students will write their ideas and thoughts using dot points or on post-it notes.

#### Write a Letter

- Write a letter to your SRC or local Member of Parliament (MP).
- Your letter will need to address the issues or improvements you would like to see in your community.
- Include language that is persuasive, respectful, and specific.

#### Create an Artwork

- Create an artwork that represents your thoughts and values about your community.
- Your artwork can include drawings, painting, collages, or other mediums.
- Use colours, symbols and imagery that help convey your message.

#### Write a Poem

- Write a poem to express your feelings and thoughts about an issue in your community that is important to you.
- Use imagery and descriptive language to help convey your message.
- It could be haiku, acrostic, black-out or another type of poetry.

### **Activity: Class Poll**

Hold a poll in your class. Students will conduct their own opinion poll on an issue that BTN covered in 2023, see below for some examples. Working in groups, students will need to decide who their sample group will be and how many people will be polled. What method will they use to conduct the poll? (Face to face interviews or written responses). Ask students to graph the opinion poll results and then reflect on the results.

## BTN Transcript: Episode 35 – 5/12/2023

Oh, hi. You're a bit early. I was just getting ready. Today is our very last episode of BTN for 2023 so I was going to do something a bit different today and take you on a bit of a tour behind the scenes. A behind, behind the news if you like. We'll also have a look back at the year and the big news stories that happened here in Australia and overseas. We'll see some of the amazing young people that we've met this year and I'll even let you see some of our bloopers as long as they're not too embarrassing.

### **World News**

Reporter: Jack Evans

INTRO: Here we are the studio. You know this place well. It's where we've brought you all of the big news stories of the year. Let's have a look back at some of things that made news all around the world in 2023.

JACK EVANS, REPORTER: Well, it's been another 365 days around the sun, on our little planet that we call Earth and this year I reckon it's fair to say it was hot. As in temperature wise. this year was really hot. In fact, experts declared it the hottest year on record.

BAHIJA: My family has a house in Marrakech in Morocco, which is about 60 kilometres away from the epicentre of the earthquake. Yeah, so they're all over there. They're all safe, thankfully.

And then there were human made disasters. Wars continued in many places, including Ukraine which marked one year since Russia invaded and on October 7th a terrorist attack in Israel sparked a war in Gaza.

2023 brought big changes for world leaders. Some were sworn into new positions of power, others or at least one were put on trial. There were meetings and greetings, a few dramas and a bit of a kerfuffle over this spy balloon. The other big news story of the year was AI and how it could change the world for better or worse.

SAM ALTMAN, OPENAI CEO: My worst fears are that we cause significant harm to the world.

ChatGPT burst onto the scenes, leaving us speechless. Which is fine because ChatGPT will write it for us. Yeah, AI taking over our jobs became a very real concern for a lot of people in 2023 including writers and actors who went on strike for months.

FRAN DRESCHER, SAG-AFTRA PRESIDENT: We are the victims here, we are being victimised by a very greedy entity.

But don't worry because there have been plenty of things that have kept us entertained here on Earth and beyond. India became the 4th country to successfully touch down on the lunar surface. Oh, and thanks to a couple of impressive space telescopes, we were gifted some images that were out of this world or rather images of other worlds.

Oh, and I almost forgot, 2023 was the year COVID-19 was declared no longer a global health emergency. But that doesn't mean Covid has gone away. In fact, cases have been on the rise. So, when you're out enjoying your summer make sure you take extra precautions.

The artist behind it, Boris Eldagsen, admitted that he was being cheeky submitting it, but wanted to start a conversation about the role of AI in art.

### **Aussie News**

JOE BARONIO, REPORTER: Australians all let us rejoice for we got a new king this year. Now, I know, that was a very British thing, but it caused a big stir for lots of people down under too.

PERSON: We've been waiting for 70 years for a coronation, most people don't know what one is, but they will tonight.

PERSON: Well, we're quite excited, we've come down to do our little part and celebrate.

But not everyone here was so excited.

REPORTER: What's the big occasion on TV for you today?

PERSON: Uh the footy. The footy more than the coronation.

And some people used the moment to call for Australia to ditch the monarchy and become a republic.

PERSON: The A.R.M. is marking the coronation of King Charles the Third with a good-natured gathering to protest the day.

JACQUI LAMBIE, INDEPENDENT SENATOR: It's about time we stood on our own two feet. We don't need a king and queen to do that, we can actually do it all by ourselves.

Speaking of changes to Australia's government, this was the year that we got to vote on whether to change the constitution to give indigenous people a permanent voice to parliament, and Aussies, young and old all across the country took to the streets, screens, and well, everywhere in between to express their views.

PERSON: A yes vote is the only vote that can result in real change for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, and I reckon Australians are up for it.

JACINTA NAMPIJINPA PRICE, SHADOW MINISTER FOR INDIGENOUS AUSTRALIANS: We shouldn't be creating separate classes of people in this country.

In the end, Australia voted no, and while some said it was the right decision.

PETER DUTTON, OPPOSITION LEADER: It's clear obviously that the referendum has not been successful, and I think that's good for our country.

It was devastating for others.

PERSON: I cry for my people; I cry for my community.

PERSON: I think that there will be a period of grief.

ANTHONY ALBANESE, PRIME MINISTER: The truth is that no referendum has succeeded without bipartisan support.

As usual, this sunburnt country saw its share of natural disasters, like fires and floods, and sometimes both at the same time. Aussies came together to help each other through tough times. But nothing brought us all together like the Matildas. At the first-ever Women's World Cup to be held in Australia, the Tillies excited.

PERSON: Go Matildas.

And inspired fans.

PERSON: I'm Matilda, and I want to be a Matilda when I grow up.

All while smashing TV records. With more than 11 million Aussies tuning in to the Semi-final against England, making it Australia's most-watched program since ratings began. And even though they didn't win

the cup, they won our hearts.

PERSON: I play soccer myself and I recently had an injury so it's just like inspired me to keep going and get back up.

There were plenty of other things to celebrate too, like victories and birthdays, and the possible resurrection of this extinct marsupial.

ANDREW PASK, RESEARCHER: It would be a world first an incredible achievement I think for the whole planet.

Oh, and remember that time the prime minister became a BTN reporter?

ANTHONY ALBANESE: Today I am a guest presenter on Behind the News.

Not really. Anyway, it's been another big year for Australia. Full of ups and downs, and everything in between. So, for now...

ANTHONY ALBANESE: That's Anthony Albanese, guest reporter for Behind the News, closing down now.

The good news is there's research going into treating and even finding a cure for CF. I've just started taking new medication that's actually targeting my cells and helping them to function properly.

LACEY: Hi, my name is Lacy, and I am going to the gym, I have something called ADHD and I'm going to tell you all about it.

It can make it more difficult to do some things, like learning at school, doing homework and sometimes talking to people. It doesn't just affect kids. Heaps of adults have it too including some really famous people.

LACEY: I've got a special trick for this one.

Some people with ADHD take medication which can help them a lot.

You showed us that the future is in good hands.

GIRL: What do you want to be when you grow up?

KIDS: Kids in space.

STUDENT: We're trying to build a habitat on the moon
